This trip takes us back to a familiar route in the city of Pittsburgh, with some new sights including: Western Penitentiary, Brunot Island, Rivers Casino, Carnegie Science Center, USS Requin Submarine, Acrisure Stadium, PNC Park, Andy Warhol Museum, H.J. Heinz plant, Herrs Island, Washington's Landing, Roberto Clemente Museum, Heinz History Museum, David L. Lawrence Convention Center, Union Station Rotunda, Point State Park, Ft. Pitt Block House, Duquesne Incline, Highmark Stadium, Gateway Clipper Fleet, and Station Square.

Expect spectacular views while riding over the 30th St. Bridge, 31st St. Bridge, Ft. Pitt Bridge, Smithfield St. Bridge and the Fort Duquesne Bridge. The tour is mostly on city trails, but some guided public roadway riding is required. The trail is mostly flat, but bridge ramps require some moderate climbs. Free parking at the trailhead.

Riders of all skill levels are welcome, though riders should be familiar with the basics of shifting bicycle gears. Riders must be 18 years or older. All riders are required to bring their own bike and PPE. Allow for about two hours for the ride.

Interested riders are welcome to join us for lunch afterward, at their own expense. Meet up details will be provided the day prior to the ride.



After serving three years in the U.S. Army Military Police Corps at Fort Hood, Leo McCarthy joined the Moon Township police force as a uniformed patrol officer in 1976. He rose through the ranks serving as a detective and sergeant before being promoted to captain in 1999, and then to chief in 2005.
